










How to help your child with....



As you read the directions to your child, track the words with your finger/their finger. Have them find the colors in a field of 2 and allow them to try to color independently. Then, provide support from the least to most intrusive way. Praise them with specific termonology ("Good job finding blue! Nice job coloring the picture!")




Spray shaving cream on a tray or table top. Allow your child to engage in sensory play and encourage them to make specific lines, numbers, letters or shapes. Provide physical support as needed and verbal input throughout (Let's make a circle! Good job making a line!)




Encourage your child to build with blocks. Have him/her use specific colors (put the blue block on next), count a certain amount (let's build with 5 blocks, help me count). Encourage your child to build tall towers, big towers, etc. Use the term "put on." Provide physical support to ensure they can grasp, pick up and put on the blocks.

**All activities lend themselves to language opportunities! Model terms using your child's AAC device OR just wih your voice! Allow your child to make choices, comment and protest. **

How to help your child with....



Focus on the commands "take out," "put on" and "find the same." Encourage independence but provide support as needed. Work on receptive skills by having your child find specific pieces (where is the apple?). Provide specific praise throughout.



Help your child make a card for someone (family member, nursing home, veteran's home). Allow them to create their own drawing or create an outline of something for them to color in. Provide them with choices of things to say on the inside. Use the yes/no board or AAC device to allow them to indicate if that is what they want to say. Model how print is written left to right as well as the parts of a letter.



Encourage your child to mold play doh into different shapes. Help your child make different things and provide verbal input throghout. Give simple directives (let's make a circle! look, this is a circle! touch the circle). Work on color identification (where is the blue play doh?) and requesting (what color do you want?).

**All activities lend themselves to language opportunities! Model terms using your child's AAC device OR just wih your voice! Allow your child to make choices, comment and protest. **
